Electricity Supply Program in Our Village**

What is CCA?
Community Choice Aggregation (CCA), is a state enabled program, which offers residents and small businesses the opportunity to receive more attractive electricity supply terms through the bargaining power of aggregation (group purchasing).

What is the Municipality's Role?
The Village enabled CCA through a local law and selected a program administrator.

Who is the CCA Administrator?
Joule Community Power, a division of Joule Assets, who has been authorized by the state to administer CCA programs in New York.

Does this program replace my utility company?
No, Central Hudson will still be responsible for billing and responding to power outages.

Can I participate if I already have rooftop solar or community solar or hydro?
Yes, you can participate!

How will my bill look?
You will still receive one bill from Central Hudson, but the supply section of your bill will show the name of the alternative supplier/CCA Administrator.

What is Opt-Out Enrollment?
Opt-out enrollment means that you will automatically be enrolled to participate in the CCA program unless you are already receiving supply service from an alternative supplier, have a block on your account, or take action to opt-out of the program. There is no fee or penalty for opting out. Not sure if you'll be automatically enrolled? Contact us!

But each answer was a roundabout that attempted to take me in a different direction. The only question that was answered with an almost clear answer was the question of what would be done with the dramatic increase in traffic at the

intersection of 301 and 9D. We were told that the likely solution would be a roundabout. What would that mean? According to the NY State Highway Department, roundabouts on 301 high roads need a diameter of 150 ft. Well, my goodness to J. Murphy's, (the historic former Hotel Marston), the finance got station, the corner of the May of the Highlands front lawn (just serve that commercial to cut two dead) and the historic house on the corner of Main Street. There were already available projections, prepared by their own consultants and presented at the 3/2/23 meeting at the Cold Spring Parkhouse, project

Courtyard Marriott case concludes with Murder 2 conviction

Dutchess County Chief Assistant District Attorney Matthew A. Weishaupt announced on Friday, May 12, that Roy Johnson was convicted by a Dutchess County jury of the crimes of Murder in the Second Degree, for the murder of Paul Kutz that occurred at the Courtyard Marriott on October 2, 2022. Johnson was also convicted of three counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Second Degree, Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Third Degree, and Reckless Endangerment in the First Degree.
